India Vision Foundation (IVF) is a New Delhi based voluntary non-governmental organization that was born in 1994 out of the Ramon Magsaysay Award (equivalent to Asian Nobel Prize). The award was conferred to Dr. Kiran Bedi, the first lady IPS (Indian Police Services) of India, for forging positive relationships between people and police through creative leadership. IVF with its team is trying to bring about a progressive change through positive reinforcement, education and values; the aim is to help the beneficiaries to become responsible and conscientious citizens by empowering them to become an asset to the society.

Today, our foundation is touching more than 3000 lives every day and is striving to give a new hope to prison inmates and their children. Till date, the foundation has successfully reached out to more than 1,50,000 beneficiaries under its Prison Reforms and Rural Development project.

TRAINING PROGRAMMES

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

In rural India, communities still find it difficult to think independently or be financially independent, especially their women folk. A nation as a whole cannot flourish unless this group of people is empowered, both intellectually and financially. The aim of the Rural Development programme, spearheaded by Navjyoti India Foundation as our lead partner, is to sensitize, train and empower the community to lead this change.

E-COMPLAINT REDRESSAL

Through this programme, the Foundation attempts to bridge the gap between citizens and the police, and bring about a greater degree of satisfaction in their interaction by providing alternative and referral services to citizens in need of assistance from the authorities through counsel on legal or official matters and facilitating IT literacy.



DIRECTOR’S KEYNOTE



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR...

Our work goes GLOBAL


We are very proud to share that last September our Director Ms. Monica Dhawan represented India Vision Foundation at 'International Symposium on Progressive abolition of violence against children in closed institutions in Central Asia- Kazakhstan'. The symposium explored the importance of separation of children from adults and abolishing the use of solitary confinement. Other key international standards like 'The United Nations (UN) Rules for the Protection of Juveniles Deprived of their Liberty (Havana Rules); The UN Standard Minimum Rules for the Administration of Juvenile Justice (Beijing Rules) and the UN Rules for the Treatment of Women Prisoners and Non-Custodial Measures for Women Offenders (Bangkok Rules) on the importance of disciplinary measures being gender-sensitive were discussed. It was agreed that exchange of information is very beneficial to all personnel working within the penal systems of Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan therefore; such interactions should be continued on a regular basis. Ms. Dhawan took training session with 15 officials from Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan on Role of NGO's in Reformation in Indian Prisons. The participants were happy to know about the Children of Vulnerable Families Project and appreciated the efforts of the foundation. Ms. Dhawan proposed to Penal Reforms International to assist in facilitating a visit of key personnel to India for purpose of a study visit to understand the model better.



Art exhibition

A unique art exhibition was organised to showcase art pieces made by prison inmates of Gurugram. This event was in collaboration with Diplomatist (A monthly magazine) & Haryana Prisons at Spice Art Gallery of Metropolitan Hotel New Delhi from 11 November - 17 November 2016.

The exhibition received huge support from diplomats from various places and a total of 74 paintings were exhibited during this exhibition. These unique art pieces were created under the able guidance of 'Nishu' Natasha Chadha Bhambri, a Contemporary Visual Artist who has been working as a volunteer with us. This exhibition gave our inmates a platform for recognition and also encourage them towards a self-reliant life.

This year we reached total of **126** beneficiaries.



THEY MADE IT TO SCHOOL



CHILDREN OF VULNERABLE FAMILIES PROJECT (CVF)



Pearly Paul Sanil

Project Manager, Children of Vulnerable Families (CVF) project

Pearly started working with the project in 2008. She is currently working as a PhD scholar on the topic 'Impact of social support on adolescent children of incarcerated parents' from Jamia Milia Islamia. She is considered as the mother of these children and her role is very vital for the project. She feels that children of incarcerated parents are one of the hidden victims of incarceration. She says "I want to see these children as responsible and contributing individuals to the society. This year we vision to orient our CVF children for competitive exams for higher education & jobs."

ABOUT

Children after the age of 6 generally lose their way they are usually subject to abuse, neglect, exploitation and trauma therefore they come away from a quality childhood and are at a risk to get influenced and drawn towards bad company. Innocent children of incarcerated families usually end up being liabilities to their extended families and even close relatives due to many reasons. We take these children (over 6 years) under our wings and help them to complete their primary and basic education through Children of Vulnerable Families project (CVF). This year we reached total of 200 by three major interventions.

A SNEAK PEAK INTO ACTIVITIES UNDER CHILDREN OF VULNERABLE FAMILIES PROJECT (CVF)

Summer Camp

A 12-day summer camp was organised by the foundation in collaboration with SOS village. We divided children into two groups according to their age groups. First week started with storytelling while second week had art & craft classes for children, the third week had theatre workshop followed by a workshop by Parwarish, an institute working for parents and child welfare on Phonetics & Sports. Final day of the summer camp was graced by the presence of MLA Mr. Ved Prakash our children gave a group dance & song performance on his arrival. He was very happy to see that such initiatives are taken by the NGO's and are helping children to learn through different methods.

Kids on Rampage

One of biggest highlights of the year and first of its kind initiative taken by India Vision Foundation (IVF) in joint collaboration with our sister concern Navijyoti India Foundation. This ramp walk created platform for the children from incarcerated backgrounds to showcase their talents and boost their self-confidence. Our children gracefully walked the ramp and were very happy to be a part of this initiative.

A visit to Mother Dairy

A first of its kind visit by 20 children from Community and 10 kids from Residential Support Program. This visit was planned so that our children get to know about how they get milk and how is the production of these products done. Children relished ice cream & flavoured milk at the unit and enjoyed a lot during this visit.



Family Meet & Awareness Session by Parwarish, an institute working for parents and child welfare.

A family meet was organized for parents. More than 42 parents were a part of this meet. With aim to know the project's activities for the year and also to make them aware & understand their role in child upbringing. During this session by team 'Parwarish' an equal opportunity was given to parents to discuss & share their issues and blessings of parenthood.



Content writing workshop for children by SoChe Foundation

This year we made our children aware of literature world, our project joined hands with SoChe, a not-for-profit social enterprise working towards environmental conservation, social upliftment and Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) advisory) to be a part of this initiative. A poem & story writing workshop was organised at Bawana Community Centre. This workshop was helpful to evoke the talent of poetry storytelling out of children. After this workshop 4 group poems & many individual poems were published in a small book in the name of Nature's Jamboree. The published book was released on World Environment Day. Our kids walked the ramp and also recited their stories & poems during this release event.



RESIDENTIAL SUPPORT PROGRAM (CVF)



Ajay Singh,
Project Coordinator, Residential Project (CVF)

Ajay has been associated with the cause now for more than 3 years. He is an engineer by profession but his passion to work with children made him choose to be a part of NGO sector. He believes that children are the future of the nation and therefore, they should not be denied with basic facilities that can help them to be better contributors. He says 'The challenges for these children coming from incarcerated backgrounds is far more than other children coming to the hostel from any different background. It is my duty to help these children to be a part of normal society and schooling so that they do not get back to the background where their parents' crime lies. I vision to help these children through various workshops, exposures & counselling and this year I want children to get good grades and actively participate in activities beyond hostel in school.'

ABOUT

The Foundation's residential school facility is for children whose parents (or one parent) are in prison, and whose other family members are unable to take care of them at home. Six schools have partnered with the Foundation to offer this facility. With a vision to bring about holistic development of children we also incorporated psychological intervention in 2016 to improve our capability of our children to deal with stress, problems.



INTERVIEW

OUR NEW PARTNER'S JOURNEY

Ms. Jothi Chetty
Ms. Jothi Chetty is the Chief Executive at Asha Deep Foundation one of our Partner schools.

Q1) How has been your experience of working with children who hail from families of prison background?

I have had a good experience while working with these children. But, as we all know every new thing comes with its own drawbacks and advantages. In initial months it was a little challenging to work with these kids since they come from a very contrasting background and have their emotional attachments back in their communities and parents. Their understanding to residential school system is a little less and therefore they take more time to adjust as compared to any other child. Also, their behaviour & redressal mechanism is a little different to small things, issues, problems but I must say we have seen a significant change in these children since last year.

Q2) What are the significant changes that you have seen in Children who have been enrolled by India Vision Foundation?

As we work I see that we have to give a lot of time to them in order to understand their requirements and also situations as compared to other children in the hostel. Since, their

background is different and many have seen the crime happening or many have had indulgence in crime we have to be really cautious in terms of understanding their behaviour, emotional and aspirational needs. Looking to a positive side I see that children enrolled with us have a vision and dream to academically prove themselves and be successful

individuals which makes a lot of difference in shaping their personality.

Q3) What is your Vision towards working for these children?

We vision to enrol as many children as possible and help them to be bright and self-reliant contributors to the society. We at Ashadeep wish to make a huge difference in lives of children by supporting their education and other basic needs.

Thanks for the health camp - Fortis Foundation!

To keep a check on well-being of mind, body & soul Fortis Foundation conducted a health camp for children. They did various tests to diagnose basic ailments in individuals of this age group. We are very glad that Fortis took this initiative for our children. After this check-up they distributed medical kits to children and also explained the relevance of a healthy life. Further, the foundation did a follow up for the same.

A NEW DIMENSION - PSYCHOLOGICAL INTERVENTIONS

Sania Girdhar, Psychologist, Residential Project (CVF)

Sania has her specialization in dealing with children.

She believes that learning should be done in an innovative, interactive way where children are able to learn new and better things. They should be able to connect with what they learn. She says that 'Learning is a two-way process and through my sessions, I try to help them handle their emotional stress and also teach them how to face various challenges in life. She motivates them to think positively.' Her vision is to help children to be financially stable and also able to deal with emotions in right way. She aspires to strengthen children emotionally so that they can do well not only in their day to day life but also in future.



ABOUT

Coming from disturbed backgrounds bring a lot of direct & indirect effect on psychological, mental and physical well-being of any individual. Children are more vulnerable to fall in trap of these situations when they are exposed to any such conflicting or stress prone environment. In order to help our children, we decided to help them to deal effectively with stress and any negative thought process that hinders their healthy growth and development by introducing a psychologist for our children.

OBSERVATIONS

Not every problem is serious, the severity and intensity varies from person to person. The signs also need to be in association with other specific symptoms. No single sign or symptom can diagnose a psychological problem. In the beginning, we tried to identify the issues that they were facing. Further, monthly themes were selected on the basis of which each activity was planned and was given sufficient time to practice the same.

In Ashadeep Foundation & Assisi Convent School according to the overall observation of the whole group I identified few common issues like emotional trauma, low concentration level, discipline, use of abusive language, poor hygiene, low self-esteem, poor group coordination, poor English grammar and spellings, difficulty in reading Hindi and English, limited knowledge about good hygienic practices, basic academic concept.



Lunch Bunch Game

Children at the residential schools were mostly scared to share their personal thoughts process & feelings towards anything small or big. Therefore, there was an immediate need of intervention to help them to communicate their feelings. A series of games were conducted throughout the spread of one month out of which this game was the most appreciated of all. In this game, colourful sheets were distributed among children and were asked a set of questions based to share their own positive qualities & as well as appreciate others. Children actively participated in this game and many got to know new things about themselves and felt very happy and celebrated!



Belly Balloon Break Session

According to the observation by our psychologist it was seen that children had small groups and quarrels from time to time on small issues. In order to help solve this a series of games were conducted to make children aware of How to behave in a group and work with each other for better results. In this game children were divided in groups of two and were asked to blow balloons and burst them through their bellies without touching the balloons. They were deliberately divided into other pairs then the existing groups. This activity helped children to not only enjoy with different children but also corporate & adjust with their partners.

Snowball Fight: A session to reveal various emotional conflicts

By far the best and most enjoyed activity of the year was a Snowball fight. As the name suggests, it was an activity about fighting with paper balls with each other to make them respect and aware the differences between each other. These paper balls were not ordinary paper balls these balls were made out of rolling papers that had strengths and weakness of their batch. After a good laughing session with the paper ball fight these children were told to unroll these balls, read and discuss the points written on the papers. This helped them to realise what are the strengths and flaws in their whole batch.



Gems anger Game

With an aim to help the children to handle their aggression issues and also to teach them how to win over anger and situations that make them angry. The interesting thing about this game was that children had to pick a gem (edible candy) without seeing the colour. According, to the colour one had to share the question's answer which was coined as per the colour of the gems. This technique was to know how they deal with their anger in different situations and how they cope up with the same.

Improvements after the interventions

We observed that children have started interacting with each other in more fun way.

- ❖ Taunting each other and level of aggression has reduced on the other hand level of cooperation and coordination has increased.
- ❖ Their self-confidence, hygiene practices, self-care, basic knowledge has improved.
- ❖ Partner- child relationship has helped younger children to adjust easily with daily life challenges with help of their elder partner.
- ❖ Children now are able to introduce themselves in English and are also learning how to initiate good conversations.
- ❖ They keep practicing few sentences in English which they speak in routine life. They have learned to greet people in English and actively do that. These positive details have helped us to identify the key areas where we can work more and provide good solutions.

HOME SUPPORT PROGRAM (CVF)



Mohd. Ahsan.K,
Project coordinator, Home Support Program(CVF)

Mohd. Ahsan has been associated with us for more than a year now. He is a very passionate individual and looks forward to make a difference in lives of children from incarcerated backgrounds. He regularly visits children under our project at their homes. He counsels, motivates and helps them for their education and family issues. He also counsels family members to address various issues regarding their children to ensure better development of their child.

Rahul Kumar Choudhary,
Social Worker, Home Support Program(CVF)

Rahul is a professional social worker with specialisation in family & child. He has been associated with the cause since April 2016. He loves his job and always tries to give a new innovation in day to day activities related to child rights through his expertise. He believes that every child should receive quality education and should be given a platform to explore his/her talents. He promotes that every child should be able to learn and contribute for betterment of the society.



ABOUT

The only project of its kind in entire north India, India Vision Foundation's home support facility allows prison inmates' children to study while staying with their families. These children usually have someone to take care of them at home, but their families are not financially strong enough to support their education. The Foundation's project, hence, comes as a godsend for them. The project opens a bank account in the name of each beneficiary or her/his guardian.



ACTIVITIES UNDER HOME SUPPORT

A day out with Children to Lotus Temple

A first of its kind exposure trip was conducted for our Home support children. Our children never got an opportunity to explore the outside world they always remain confined to their routine of school to home and vice versa. This time we took our children for a visit to Lotus temple. Children were happy to see the Lotus temple and also asked many questions from our coordinators. They were very happy to roam and play around. After the visit the kids enjoyed a very good meal at McDonalds. It was a fun filled learning experience for them.

In order to make children aware of their rights a session with every home support child was done. We introduced children to their basic rights like:

1. Right To Protection: Safe Environment, Protection from Abuse & Exploitation.
2. Right To Survival: Health & Hygiene, Shelter, Nutrition, Standard of Living.
3. Right To Participation: Freedom of Expression
4. Right To Development: Education, Culture activities, Freedom of Thought



Community mapping

A community resource mapping exercise was conducted with our Home Support children to sensitise and also make them aware about the resources that they can use in coming times. A complete exercise was done to map different places like Anganwadi, Hospitals, Schools, Banks etc. The aim was to make them better informed and

resourceful. Our project coordinators also visited and connected them with training & vocational training centres so that when their vacations start they will be able to enrol themselves into vocational courses/ trainings of computer and English.

Our kids were happy to get shoes. These small gifts make a very big difference in the lives of these individuals. Children loved their shoes and showed our project coordinators by wearing them and posing for pictures. We once again Thanks Bata for this lovely gesture.



COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM (CVF)

Alka is an active individual working with communities for more than 4 years now. She got associated with us in March 2016 with Bawana. She firmly believes that her actions are leading to welfare for many individuals directly & indirectly. According to her she says that 'My efforts are not for a short duration but it is for a longer benefit to the community.' She regularly tries to motivate the children and counsels them to be better than yesterday. Presently, she is trying to establish skill building & extracurricular activities like theatre, poem writing with children.



WORKSHOP CONDUCTED FOR PARENTS ON HEALTHY PARENTING

A first of its kind workshop was an initiative by project coordinators Ahsan & Rahul of Home Support under the guidance of Mrs. Pearly Paul, Project manager. As per the observation of our coordinators they found that there is a significant gap between parents & children in terms of communication, bonding and much more. We realised that as a foundation we are the only means of bridging this gap between them to make them self-reliant and independent in all capacities. Poor Parenting & Bad Parenting styles influences a child in every aspect like children's health, behaviours (physical activity and dietary intake), communication, learning, social appearance, progress and many more. It is the largest variable contributing to childhood illnesses and accidents; teenage pregnancy and substance misuse; truancy, school disruption, and underachievement; child abuse; unemployability; juvenile crime; and mental illness. Many parents raised questions and queries stating various circumstances and behaviour that often leads to aggression and beating. Our coordinators gave them practical solutions to resolve such situations. After successfully completing this workshop in several visits we could see that parents were taking keen interest to know updates of their children. Many children shared that my parents have started talking to me more now. Such workshops are very important to make parents aware of whereabouts of their children.

ABOUT

With regular visits and small summer camps we tried to make a difference in lives of children residing in the marginalised areas of Delhi. After school and in summer break our children started coming back to the community. We found that there is an urgent need for community visits. Therefore initiated our community visits and did counselling and awareness sessions for 60 children in our community. With regular follow up's and rising numbers we decided to start a Community Centre in 2014 where we not only did our counselling and awareness classes but also opened a library and allowed children to play games. Today, many children from community use the centre as a study hall when they have space crunch or some family issues. This project is towards empowering young minds in communities for a better future.



EVENTS THROUGHOUT YEAR 2016

Training at National Institute for Social Communication, Research and Training (NISCORT)

14 selected children from Bawana community attended a three-day residential training programme at NISCORT. The aim of the program was to prepare youth for making e-community magazine.




SWACHH MELA - A step towards clean India

Our children became a part of 'Swachh Mela'. This was a health and hygiene awareness campaign in collaboration with Nine is Mine (In response to Nelson Mandela's call to keep our governments accountable to their promise of halving poverty by the year 2015 and ending it by 2025, children in India have rallied themselves into a movement called NINEISMINE). 30 children from Community Program from Bawana was a part of Swachh Mela Abhiyan.

So we started three years ago with India Vision Foundation (IVF). Teach India Program is a need based program like one NGO which wanted to develop computer skills among their kids. In order to train them in computer skills we developed all 12 modules according to their needs like how to work on Microsoft word,

PowerPoint and so on. We did same for India Vision Foundation kids as Pearly, said they need training for conversational English as it is very important. We didn't want to do something that may not be meaningful for these students therefore, she gave us the background of their parents if they are coming from prisons or are they living with them. So our kids created tailor made module for them. We also adapted the same and like in our first module. We use to ask what did your parents do? This time we changed that question because we didn't want the students to be embarrassed.


Connecting with Teach India Program

FROM DUST TO DIAMONDS

Story of Vijay a shining example from Children of Vulnerable Families Project


‘I still remember when Chander Bhaiya(Presently, heading accounts department at IVF) came to meet me at our house, I was 13 years of age. I was already studying in a government school and use to live with my father & sister until my mother was inside prison. IVF helped my sister Neha to get enrolled in Assisi Convent School, Noida in nursery under a residential set up.’

Vijay’s mother was imprisoned as an undertrial for 4 years in Tihar prison under the case of kidnapping. He used to live with his paternal uncle while her sister lived with his mother until she got released.

Today, Vijay works with one of a very renowned automobile company as a Pro technician and he gives all the credit of his success to the foundation.

Mr. Chander Shekhar shared with us that ‘Vijay was a very introvert kid he never even spoke a single word in front of me. When I tried to ask him anything he use to look down and maintain no eye contact with me whenever I asked anything. Today when I see him as a confident and successful individual I really feel happy and proud that we have saved one of the next victims to crime. Vijay was not academically strong and he was too shy to explore his interests I still remember the first thing he shared with me while talking was his interest and love for cricket & Sachin. He talked for hours about the same with me and I was happy to speak more and more with him. This session actually helped us to break ice between two of us from my coming visits I was able to see that he became quite keen and use to look forward for my visits. He confessed many things and usually confined his talks to me I started to realise that he does not share a very good bond with his father and due to absence of his mother felt lonesome. I kept my counselling sessions on with him and also helped him to find tuition classes so that he picks up in academics. Seeing his academic status after few months I felt that it is important for him to gain a skill. Therefore, we got him enrolled in ITI for Motor Mechanic Wheel(Vocational Training) and for 11th & 12th through open school.’

Today, when we see Vijay we see him as a different person he is actively engaged in interacting with so many people around his workplace at our foundation near his residence and who not. He even involves himself in social work by helping nearby families through finance, food or any kind of help they might require. He is a responsible, self-reliant individual supporting his family and also giving back to the society a perfect reflection of our nurturing and mission.


5th National Conference of Prison heads of States and Union Territory on Prison reforms

A WAVE OF REFORMATION

In conversation with Sh. Yashpal Singhal, DG Haryana Prisons

Sh. Yash Pal Singhal,
Director General, Haryana Prisons

Sh. YashPal Singhal, is an IPS officer from 1983 batch, prior to appointment he was the Director General Police (DGP) of Haryana Police. He has also served as the Director General of Vigilance Bureau. Today, with his able guidance and mentorship Haryana Prisons is witnessing a huge wave of reformation.

What is the journey of reformation that Haryana prisons have witnessed?

Haryana prisons have witnessed a very drastic change. It is also said that a wave of reformation has trickled down from one to another. As far as I have seen there have been many small, big significant and remarkable changes in terms of maintenance, cleanliness and innovation across all the prisons. When I look back I see a very contrasting picture as per the conditions inside prison premises. However, I must say that few prisons were already working in the direction of change. Majorly, maximum changes penned down when the collaboration with India Vision Foundation started in 2012. They started working in Gurgaon (Now Gurugram) prison from the scratch and today we see the prison as a model prison for other prisons across India. I think this collaboration has been a boon for the prison. Today when I look towards 2016 I see that it has been an



eventful year. This year has brought a lot of healthy competition among all the prisons across Haryana.

What is the role of India Vision Foundation in bringing the wave of Reformation?

India Vision Foundation (IVF) has been associated with Haryana Prison for more than 4 years. I feel that India Vision Foundation has played multiple roles in bringing a wave of reformation they have not only worked for the inmate's' progress by introducing their 3 S model of Shiksha(Education), Sanskar(Value Education) and Skills (Training & Development) but also have worked as a facilitator between the administration and the inmates. With last year trainings I see them as pioneers in training prison officers to bring reformation in prisons. I am very happy to see this NGO working with such consistency and efficiency as many NGO come to prison and do not work. The major contribution of IVF has been to bring corporate near to

Administration by becoming a reliable link. Corporate had faith in IVF and IVF had in Haryana prisons and vice versa. Because CSR funding was available for Haryana prisons which in turn immensely helped in reformation. I feel IVF is doing a wonderful and I wish them the best and keep the work cycle on.

What is that one thing that makes Gurugram prison stand out as role model for other prisons.

I feel the credit goes to the efforts of Mr. Harinder Singh, Superintendent, Gurugram prison and India Vision Foundation (IVF) collaboration. They have worked as a team to uplift and also polish the prison inside out. From infrastructure to the quality in skilling inmates they have tried to deliver the best and this is how the prison had become the much talked about one. I feel if anywhere anything good is happening it will be recognized at times immediately or eventually with time. I feel this collaboration model between IVF and Haryana Prisons is delivering very visible & quality results.

As a foundation under our capacity we have reintegrated many inmates how do you feel about this? Also, are you planning to put forth any steps for post release of inmates in collaboration with the foundation?

It is a wonderful thing, I feel that there has to be someone who has to close the loop and help an individual to rebuild their lives from a new base. This is by far the best initiatives taken by India Vision Foundation.

INSIDE GURUGRAM PRISON

I feel that the wave of reformation was started by Dr. Kiran Bedi in early 90's. I have witnessed the wave of reformation in Haryana prisons in recent years. As Superintendent of Gurugram prison I feel reformation is an ongoing process it took us 4 years to be a role model. We further invited prison officials from different states and train them for the same through our trainings. We showed them how reformation can be done and also motivated them to complete their targets towards a reformed prison. This would not have been possible without right direction from Sh. Yashpal Singhal, Director General (DG) Haryana prisons. I am happy that Gurugram prison became a live example of the reformation process. I would like to highlight one of the examples - replication of software developed by an inmate named as 'Phoenix' and birthday celebrations of children under the crèche project. I feel Haryana prisons are moving towards being better and more sensitized.


Vertical Interactive Learning Programme - III

In order summarize and take a combined feedback from the learnings of previous training a Vertical Interactive Learning Programme - V was conducted under the able guidance of Dr. Kiran Bedi & Sh. Yashpal Singhal, Director General Haryana Prisons. 20 Superintendents from 19 Haryana prisons participated in this one day program. During the training program participants reflected on their learnings and shared their vision for new initiatives, improvements & its implementation to be done inside their prison for the year.

Dasna Prison warders Training

We conducted a three day training for Newly recruited warders at Dasna prison. The objective of the training was to encourage the warders to work towards reformation/ rehabilitation of inmates. With the theme of transforming prisons. Last day of the training was exposure visit to Gurugram Prison where the warders were made aware of the various activities that IVF team does to help inmates.



National Training Program

Sponsored by Bureau of Police Research and Development (BPR&D) in collaboration with Haryana prisons & India Vision Foundation.

Vertical Interaction Course - I

was a unique 5 day training programme for Head of the prison department to Assistant/ Deputy Jailor or head of the sub jail. This course was designed to refresh the critical learning elements with an aim to increase overall effectiveness and professionalism of the Prison Department. 21 Prison Officers from Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Punjab, Himachal Pradesh, Haryana, Delhi and Chandigarh took part in this program scheduled from 26 – 30 September 2016.



Seeing Is Learning - I

A Three day training workshop was held at Gurgaon Prison from 21st November to 23rd November. The workshop was jointly organized by Haryana Prison Department and India Vision Foundation. It was sponsored by the Bureau of Police Research and Development (BPR&D), New Delhi. Seeing is Learning is a unique exercise wherein the participants of different levels from different prisons of the country were exposed to various reform activities so that they could see and learn all the aspects of initiating, executing, evaluating and supervising such activities and also discuss various challenges in monitoring and continuing such practices. It also offered an opportunity to share their best practices and problems that they face in their role as prison officers. The workshop was attended by 22 prison officers of different levels from 10 states of the country and each brought his/her own regional flavor and expertise to the training!

Mr. Harinder Singh, Course Director, and Superintendent of Gurugram Prison shares his feedback on Trainings

The training has involvement of three major stakeholders primarily: Prison Administration, Prison officials & India Vision Foundation. During this training Prison officials get a chance to have practical learning by seeing different kind of work & ongoing reformation activities which gives very good impact on their thinking process. The Administration on the other hand gets a fresh perspective towards things by hosting the training for the officials coming from different states. I personally feel that training brings about a healthy form of competition amongst individuals and further leads to improvement in communications structure. I have seen that my fellow officials have started to share more proactively about their issues, solutions, ideas and much more. This has been more of an exposure not only for the officers coming from different states but also for us as Host in many ways. Training has helped us to share our work with different states resulting in visits by Senior officers, Judges and many others. Most of the trainees at the training are extremely happy to see the 3S model by India Vision Foundation that has been the highlights during our training process



INTERVIEW

'ROLE OF NGO'S AS TRAINERS INSIDE PRISONS'

IPS Meera Chadha,

Director General, Bureau of Police Research & Development, Delhi, talk about 'Role of NGO's as trainers inside Prisons'

Meera Chada studied Policy Analysis in Law Enforcement at the University of Minnesota, USA, for this, she was also awarded the President's Medal for meritorious service in 1997. She had also awarded with the Police medal and the Director General's insignia for meritorious service and Hubert Humphrey Fellowship (2001-02) in the three decades of her policing career. During her unbroken period with the State Crime Investigation Department from 1993-95, a very important case was investigated by her that case was Jalgaon sex scandal. It was in 1981, she became an IPS officer of the Maharashtra cadre, served as Deputy Commissioner of Police at Mumbai between 1987-91.

According to you what is the role of NGO's working in Prison?

NGOs working in prisons have different roles e.g. some are working in the field of literacy of prisoners, some are teaching them crafts/imparting skills, while others are giving legal aid. So they help fill gaps where prison administration either does not have resources or resources are inadequate. While big cities have NGOs collaborating with prison officials, I find this lacking in small places.



NGO'S & ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS SHOULD WORK IN SYNERGY WITH PRISON ADMINISTRATION

What in your view is role of India Vision Foundation as a training partner with Haryana Prison administration?

I think Haryana prison administration values this collaboration.

What were your key observations during your visit to Gurgaon Prison during 'Seeing Is Learning'

I was impressed with Haryana prison administration collaborating with NGOs in various fields.

In your view what shall be the

ideals of a Model Prison?

To reform and rehabilitate prisoners should be the aim of any prison.

What in your view shall be the basic essential training needs that should be mandated for inmates in all prisons?

Basic literacy and one or two vocational skills that would help a prisoner post release.

As an NGO we are multi tasking in various dimensions. How can we seek support from organizations like BPR&D to make a progressive change?

BPR&D welcomes collaboration with all academic institutes and NGOs of excellence. We would appreciate more research in the field of correctional administration.

As Director General of BPR&D what is your vision for training of Prison officials & collaboration with NGO's?

Though prisons is a state subject yet BPR&D conducts research in the field of Correctional Administration and provides training to the officials working in this field. We hold National Conference on Prison Reforms, Prison Duty Meet and have recently created a Micro Mission on Correctional Administration. We bring Prison officials, academicians, Law universities/schools and NGOs together to reflect upon the state of correctional administration and act thereafter. Ours is an ongoing process.

RURAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



“FOR A SUSTAINABLE LIFE”



The rural interventions of Navjyoti India Foundation contributed its relentless service in 72 villages of Sohna Block under three program areas – Child Education, Skill Up gradation and Community Development.

Under our Balgurukul Program – a Child Leadership Program, 103 sessions were facilitated with 426 beneficiaries in thematic areas of Science, Music, Dance, Theatre, Yoga, Meditation and Library. A notable achievement was identification of 96 Balgurukul Teachers who are taking classes in their own community and motivating other children from the community to harness their talent and potential. Another significant achievement was implementation of 12 Community Development Projects by Balgurukul Teachers.

As part of our Skill Up-gradation Program, we conducted specialized employment oriented vocational skills and training to 120 rural women from the villages of Sohna Block. The beneficiaries were imparted training on Stitching and Tailoring under a standardized curriculum. In addition to the regular classes, the beneficiaries participated in exposure visits, Charcha Mandal and specific training sessions on making glass candles, penal bags, bag weaving and embroidery designs etc.

Under our Community Development Program, we have been able to train approximately 935 women through trainings on operational aspects of self-help groups, entrepreneurship, crime prevention, financial literacy etc. Approximately 250 community members contributed in the development of their village through their participation in cleanliness drives.
