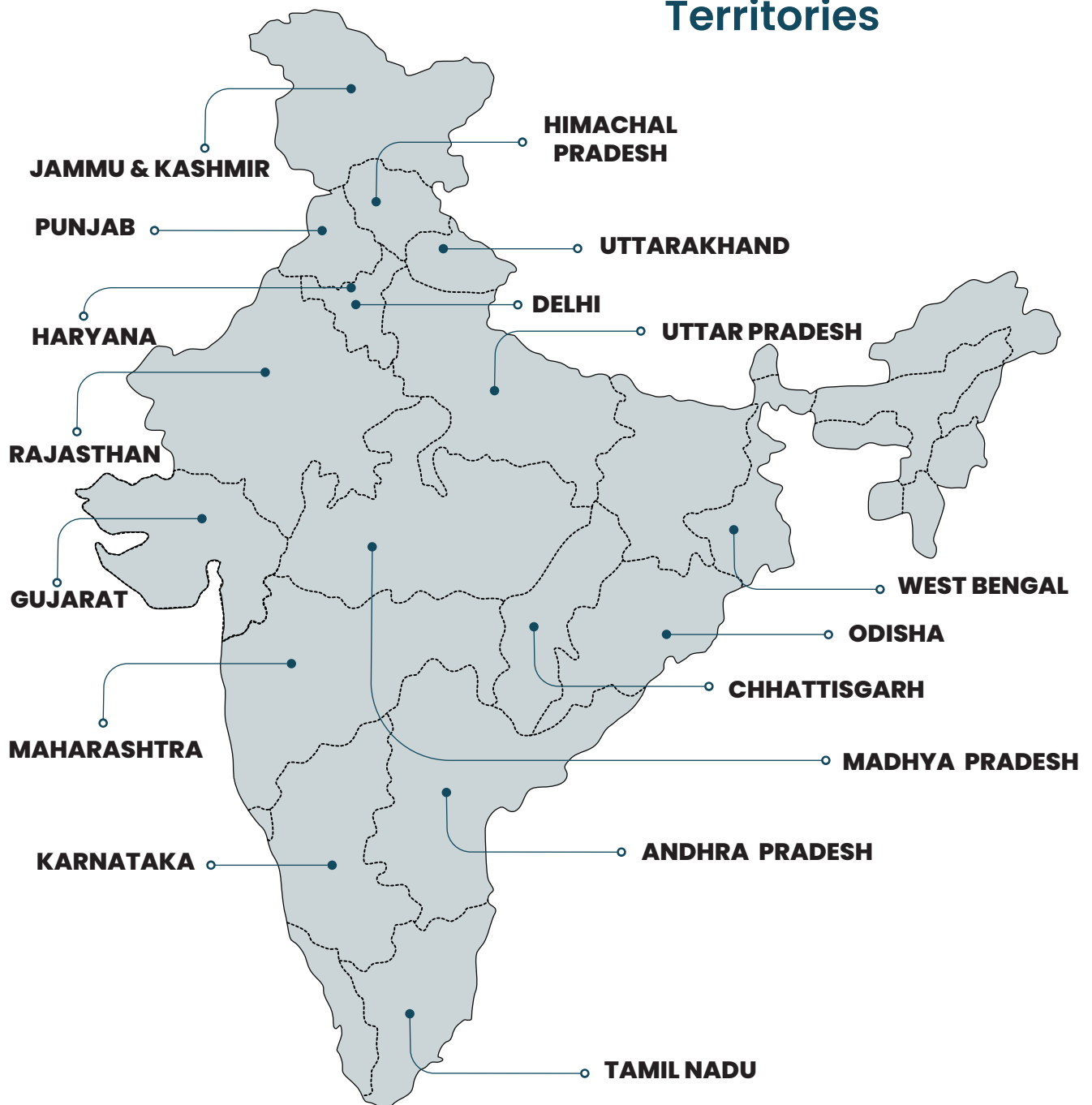

Inside Prison Program aims to reform inmates (male, female & youth) inside prison under its 4S Model of reformation: Shiksha, Sanskar, Skills, and Swasth along with other therapeutic interventions (Art, Music, Dance, Gardening) along with life skill sessions, sports activities & festival celebrations to transform these vulnerable and marginalized population with the motto of 'No One Left Behind' for a safe, just, and resilient society.

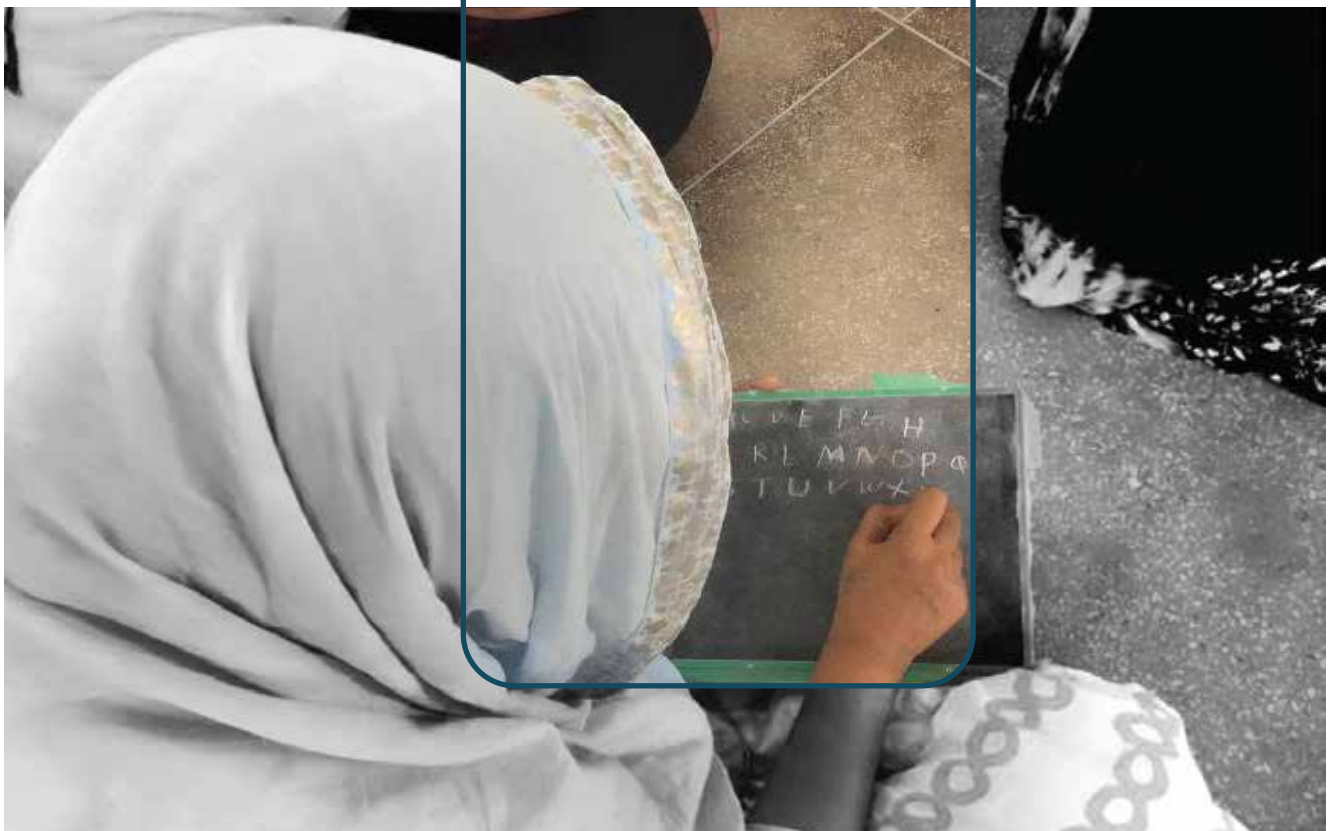
SHIKSHA

“Shiksha” stands for more than just literacy: it’s about unlocking potential, restoring self-worth, and rebuilding futures through education inside prisons. It empowers inmates with foundational learning, academic skills, and a pathway to reintegration.

IMPACT SNAPSHOT (APRIL 2024 – MARCH 2025):

- 3,383 inmates engaged in educational activities.
- Academic pathways through NIOS & IGNOU.
- Adult literacy, open schooling, and higher education courses offered.
- Special focus on women inmates and young learners.
- Education tailored to diverse literacy levels and life goals.

“Shiksha” breaks barriers, nurtures minds, and lays the foundation for a new beginning.



SANSKAR

“Sanskar” represents the heart of reformation. Instilling moral values, emotional resilience, and behavioral transformation among inmates. It is about nurturing the human spirit, guiding incarcerated individuals to reconnect with empathy, responsibility, and self-awareness.

IMPACT SNAPSHOT (APRIL 2024 – MARCH 2025):

- 38,840 inmates benefited from value-based interventions.
- Focus on mental health, emotional intelligence, and behavior change.
- Activities included group counseling, meditation, and art-based therapy.
- Strengthened peer support systems and internal prison community bonds.
- Notable engagements included sessions by renowned motivational speakers like Vikrant Mahajan and exposure visits for children born in prison.

“Sanskar” heals from within, laying the foundation for a peaceful mind, positive identity, and meaningful reintegration.



SWASTH

“Swasth” ensures that physical and mental well-being are at the core of rehabilitation. It aims to promote a healthy, hygienic, and dignified life inside prisons, recognizing that true reform begins with caring for the body and mind.

IMPACT SNAPSHOT (APRIL 2024 – MARCH 2025):

- 2,82,229 inmates reached through health and hygiene initiatives.
- 22 prisons covered under the Menstrual Hygiene Project.
- Beneficiaries: 1,244 women inmates.
- 17,000+ sanitary napkins distributed.
- 17 vending machines installed.
- Hygiene kits, sanitation sessions, and clean-living awareness.
- Holistic wellness with a focus on mental peace and self-care.

SKILLS

“Skills” focuses on empowering inmates with vocational and livelihood skills, helping them become self-reliant and prepared for employment or entrepreneurship post-release. The aim is to convert idle time into a productive opportunity that builds confidence and independence.

IMPACT SNAPSHOT (APRIL 2024 – MARCH 2025):

- 3,491 inmates trained in vocational and livelihood skills.
- Sewing, embroidery, beauty & wellness, handicraft training provided.
- LED Diyas project: Produced 1,200+ decorative pieces during Diwali.
- Green Skills: Over 2,500 kg vermicompost produced.
- Entrepreneurship support: Former inmates now running businesses post-release.

“Skills” offers a second chance equipping inmates to re-enter society with dignity and purpose.



THERAPEUTIC INTERVENTIONS



India Vision Foundation integrates creative and nature-based therapies to promote emotional healing, inner peace, and behavioral transformation among inmates. These therapeutic activities serve as powerful tools to reduce stress, express emotions, and nurture mental well-being in correctional spaces.



ART THERAPY:

Uses creative expression: drawing, painting, and crafts to help inmates process emotions and trauma.

Overview: Inmates express their inner world through art, boosting self-awareness, emotional release, and confidence.



MUSIC THERAPY:

Music as a tool for emotional release, memory recall, and stress reduction.

Overview: Singing, rhythm, and listening activities promote calmness, self-reflection, and positivity inside prison.



DANCE THERAPY:

Movement-based therapy that encourages emotional and physical expression.

Overview: Dance sessions enhance mood, reduce anxiety, and build social connection and body confidence.



GREEN THERAPY:

Engages inmates in nature through gardening, composting, and green care.

Overview: Inmates cultivate plants and manage green spaces, developing responsibility, mindfulness, and peace.

RADIO PARVAAZ

India Vision Foundation launched Radio Parvaaz, a Prison Community Radio Initiative, to connect inmates facing mental health challenges, especially during COVID-19. The initiative broadcasts engaging content on entertainment, social relevance, and life skills through stories, songs, meditation, and yoga.

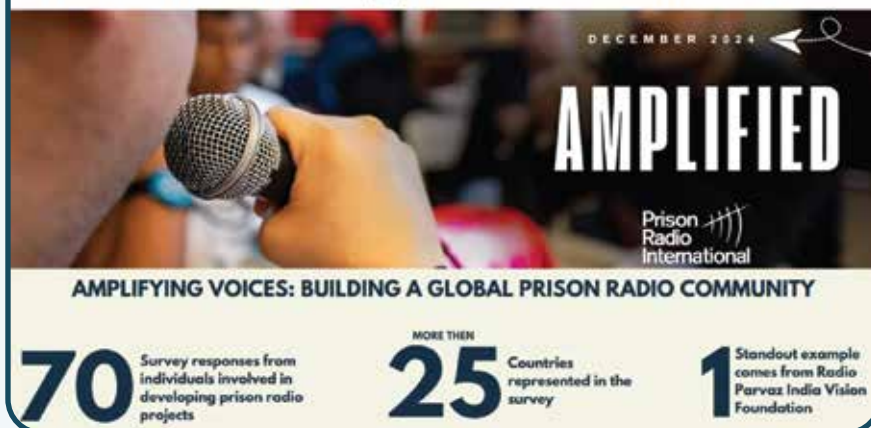

IMPACT OF RADIO PARVAAZ ON INMATES

- **42%** felt socially connected and showed behavioral improvement.
- **33%** experienced mental health improvements.
- **27%** saw personal development benefits.
- **24%** used the radio as a tool to cope with imprisonment.

MENSTRUAL HEALTH AND HYGIENE INITIATIVE

This initiative aims to promote menstrual hygiene management among female inmates by ensuring access to safe, hygienic products and accurate information. By addressing taboos and fostering open dialogue, it seeks to uphold dignity, improve physical and mental wellbeing, and empower women to take charge of their health. Integrating gender-sensitive care within custodial settings not only supports rehabilitation but also affirms the right to bodily autonomy and self-respect.

PROJECT ATMABAL – YERWADA PRISON, PUNE

An outcome of the compassionate involvement of **Mrs. Saina Ruzbeh Bharucha, Permanent Trustee, India Vision Foundation**, aims to promote the **holistic well-being of 300+ women inmates and 15 crèche children in the Yerwada Prison, Maharashtra**. Over 100 heartfelt conversations under “दिल की बात,” fostered cultural engagement,



skill-building, healthcare, and education, and provided emotional, mental, and physical support. Early learning, emotional care, health checkups and essential support for children ensured a nurturing and dignified environment.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH:

Under the **Apna Maharashtra initiative**, India Vision Foundation, led by Ms. Saina Ruzbeh Bharucha, **empowered 650+ youth of Maharashtra** with cultural pride, social responsibility, and leadership skills. The Foundation engaged with students through motivational talks, interactive sessions, and personality development programs in schools, colleges, and universities.

GLIMPSES FROM AMRITSAR PRISON

At Amritsar Prison, India Vision Foundation is transforming lives through vocational training. Guided by skilled trainers, women are learning stitching, embroidery, crochet, soft toy making, and block painting, turning prison time into a path of empowerment, self-reliance, and dignity for a brighter future. The program has **reached a total of 124 beneficiaries**, including **10 children**.

EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT

“The crèche inside Prison” aims to engage with children of prison inmates who are less than 6 years of age by enrolling them in the inside prison day, care centre, facilitating elementary education through a contextualized & standardized curriculum, in addition to providing them with nutritious food, and health care & holistic development through play-way methods.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

New Crèche at **Ayodhya Prison**, in partnership with **JB Nursery Schools Society**.

Mother sensitization: Quarterly Session was organized for female inmates in Tihar, Ghaziabad, Gurugram, and Faridabad prisons to raise awareness about proper childcare.



Health and Nutrition: In Tihar Prison, children received proper nutrition through a healthy diet, facilitated in collaboration with Safe Secure and India Vision Foundation.

Distribution of Essential items: Like shoes, clothes, and winter uniforms were distributed to crèche children to ensure their well-being and support their overall growth.



Exposure Visit: Organized an exposure visit to the Rail Museum for eight children aged 3-6 years.

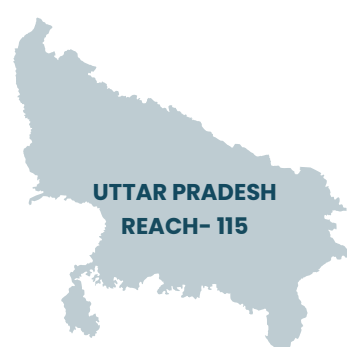

REHABILITATION AND RE-INTEGRATION PROGRAM

Rehabilitation & Re-integration Program aims to enable the released inmates to put their lives in prison behind them and embark on a journey that recognizes their talent, skills, and self-respect to reduce the chances of reoffending and help them reintegrate into society.

PRE-RELEASE INTERVENTION

- 1,600 beneficiaries participated in a 'Readiness to Release' counselling session conducted inside the prison.
- Prepared 42+ beneficiaries for a smooth reintegration process and return to community life.
- 120+ hours invested in one-on-one and group discussions.

POST-RELEASE INTERVENTION

- 342 beneficiaries supported through:
 1. Telecalling
 2. Home visits
 3. Virtual meetings
- 10 beneficiaries earned INR 1.54 Lakhs through Project Saakaar, a self-entrepreneurship initiative.
- 2 beneficiaries successfully placed in the IT sector after release.



COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION

- 4,560 people reached through the distribution of essential items in crime-prone communities.
- Focused on bridging gaps and creating sustainable reintegration environments for released individuals and their families.

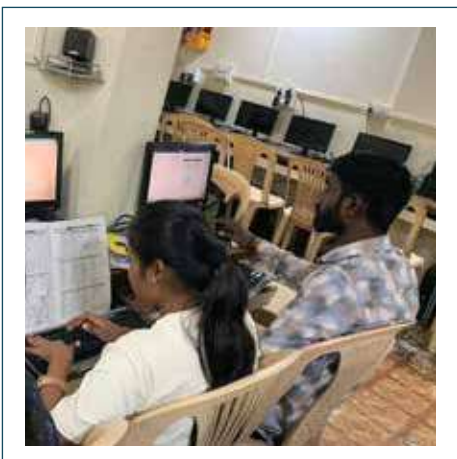


PSYCHO-SOCIAL INTERVENTION

- 382 hours dedicated to pre-release, post-release, and community mobilization.

ALUMNI NETWORK STRENGTHENED

- 1209 old alumni reconnected (53 women, 156 men)
- 133 new alumni added (42 women, 91 men)
- Emotional and peer support ensured across multiple locations.



FAMILY SUPPORT

- Facilitated skill development for vulnerable families, including enrolling a youth (child of an incarcerated woman) in a computer course in Maharashtra.
- Legal, emotional, and educational support provided as part of family reintegration.

ALUMNI ENGAGEMENT

In 2024, India Vision Foundation hosted a landmark Alumni Meet on 19th May at Springdales School, New Delhi, celebrating 30 years of impact. Bringing together **269** attendees. The event fostered a sense of belonging, reflection, and inspiration. Key sessions with Dr. Kiran Bedi and Rohit Rajpal emphasized emotional intelligence, gratitude, and purpose-driven living. The day featured performances, motivational talks, certificate distributions, and heartfelt reunions.

Alumni expressed deep gratitude for India Vision Foundation's continuous support and requested future sessions on employment, skills, and rehabilitation opportunities. The meet highlighted the strength of our growing alumni community and underlined the importance of regular engagement for long-term reintegration.

This flagship event not only celebrated past journeys but also laid the groundwork for stronger future connections. Learnings from this meet are shaping the roadmap for enhanced alumni support in 2025 and beyond.



PROJECT SAAKAAR

Project Saakaar is an initiative under the Rehabilitation and Reintegration Program of India Vision Foundation, designed to provide financial support to released inmates, helping them start small businesses, develop entrepreneurial skills, and successfully reintegrate into society. By fostering employment through self-run businesses, Project Saakaar seeks to lower recidivism rates and enable sustainable livelihoods for these individuals. Till now, a **Total Of 10 Released Inmates** received support from India Vision Foundation and started their small business, including stitching, food stall and beauty parlor.

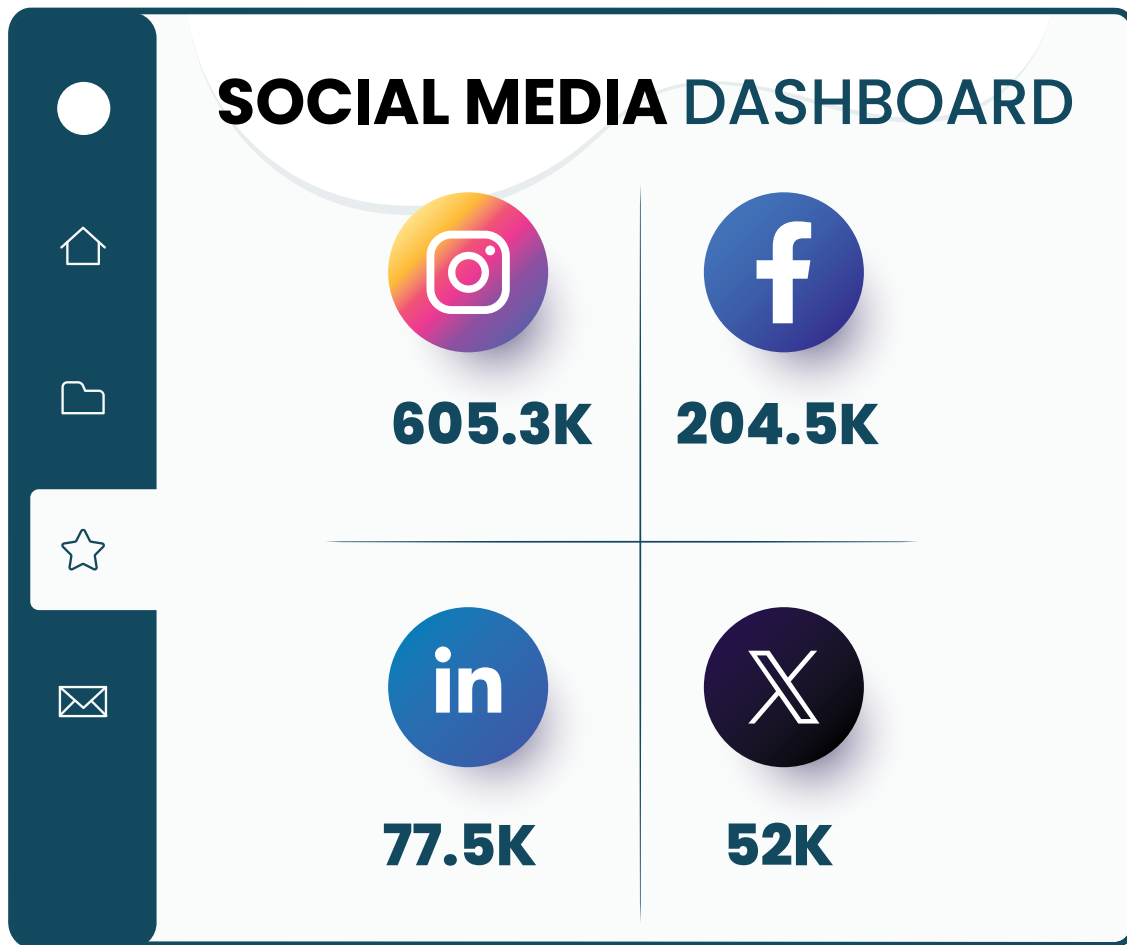

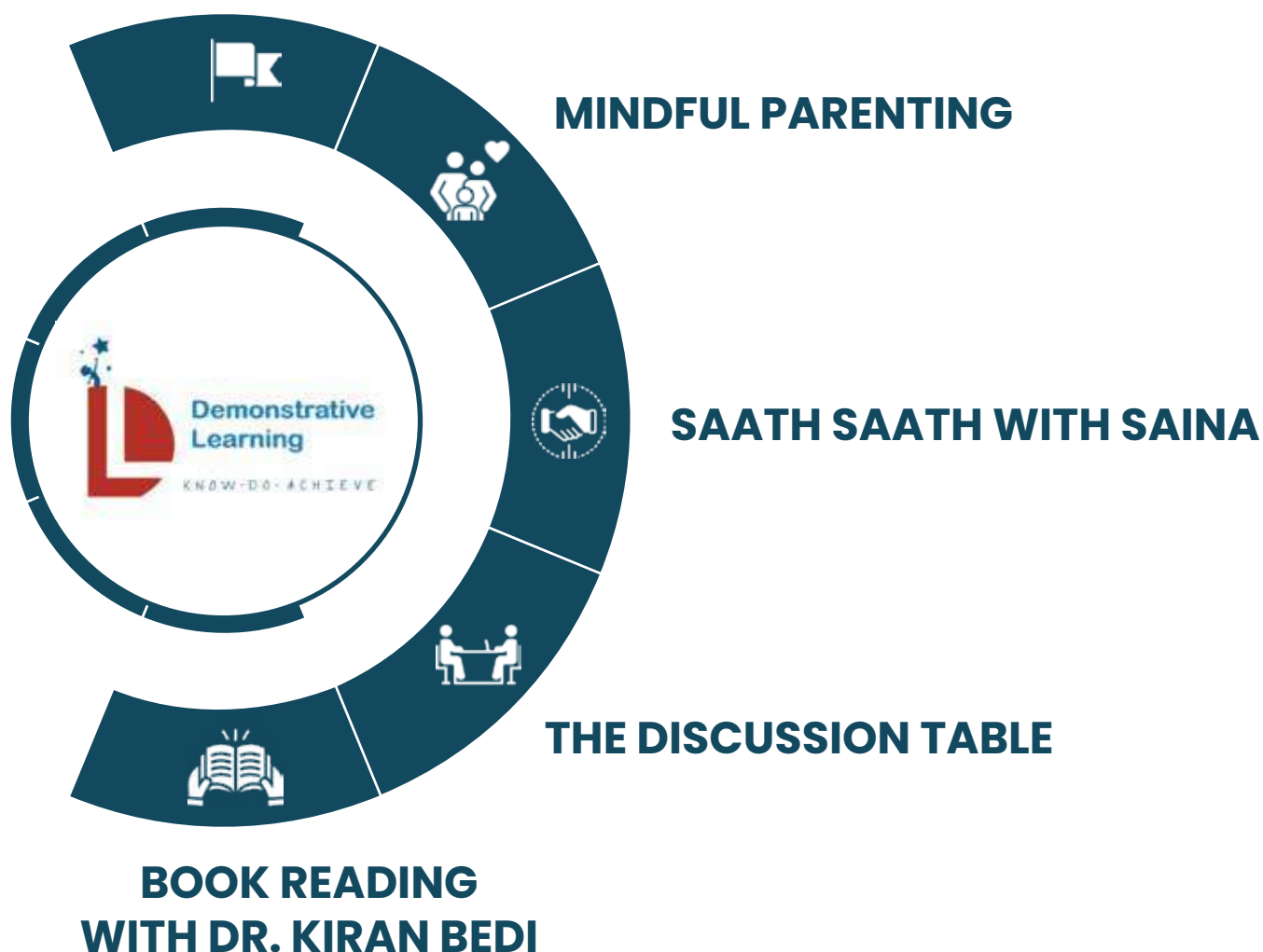
