WHY “FROM EXCLUSION TO INCLUSION: BUILDING HUMAN CAPITAL”

“From Exclusion to Inclusion: Building Human Capital” reflects the reality that incarceration often leads to layered exclusion, affecting not only individuals inside prisons, but also their families and children. Disrupted education, social stigma, emotional distress, and limited opportunities create cycles that push already vulnerable lives further to the margins.

At India Vision Foundation, our work begins where exclusion is most visible. Through sustained engagement inside prisons, with families, and with children of incarcerated parents, we focus on strengthening human capital as the foundation of inclusion. We believe that real inclusion is not achieved through isolated interventions, but through continuous investment in education, skills, mental well-being, values, and dignity.

Our work with children under the Children of Vulnerable Families (CVF) program demonstrates the power of this approach. Children who once faced uncertainty and interruption in learning have today performed confidently on global platforms, a testament to what becomes possible when care, stability, and opportunity are provided early and consistently. These journeys affirm that potential is not lost due to circumstance; it is unlocked through support.

Within prisons, our focus on skills development, psychosocial support, health, and value-based learning enables individuals to rebuild confidence and capability well before release. Rehabilitation, for us, is preventive, strengthening human capital to reduce reoffending and enable meaningful reintegration.

Inclusion, therefore, is not an event but a continuum, from prison to family, classroom to community. This theme captures India Vision Foundation’s commitment to transforming exclusion into opportunity by placing human potential at the centre of justice, rehabilitation, and social development.



Last year, I wrote that we needed deeper partnerships, stronger innovation, and the belief that every person deserves a chance to rebuild. This year proved that when those three things align, lives transform in ways that cross every boundary we once thought fixed.

Deeper partnerships carried a CVF alumna to the INCCIP Global Conference in Seoul, our Cradle to Career Model to Amsterdam's Global Alliance on Prison Reform, and India Vision Foundation into founding membership of the Global Alliance of Civil Society on Prison Reform. Stronger innovation gave 56,327 inmates 2,190 hours of Radio Parvaaz programming — 90% reporting improved well-being — and opened its first female prison station at Yerwada.

The 4S model reached 3,41,845 inmates across 172 prisons. 81 Peer Leaders emerged from within. Seven hundred and forty-five prison officials were trained. Over 2,600 children grew through uninterrupted education and care. Released inmates became nurses, entrepreneurs, and community leaders. And Neha, once a frightened child in our Tihar crèche, today mentors 72 young people as a Project Coordinator — proof of what the journey from exclusion to inclusion truly looks like.

These are not just yearly achievements. They are building blocks for a safer future — with fewer wasted lives, broken families, and victims. I thank all supporters in government, the private sector, and civil society for walking with us. Together, we are reforming prisons and reshaping communities. May the coming years move us closer still to a crime-free, compassionate society.

A Grand Stage for **CONFIDENCE AND DREAMS**

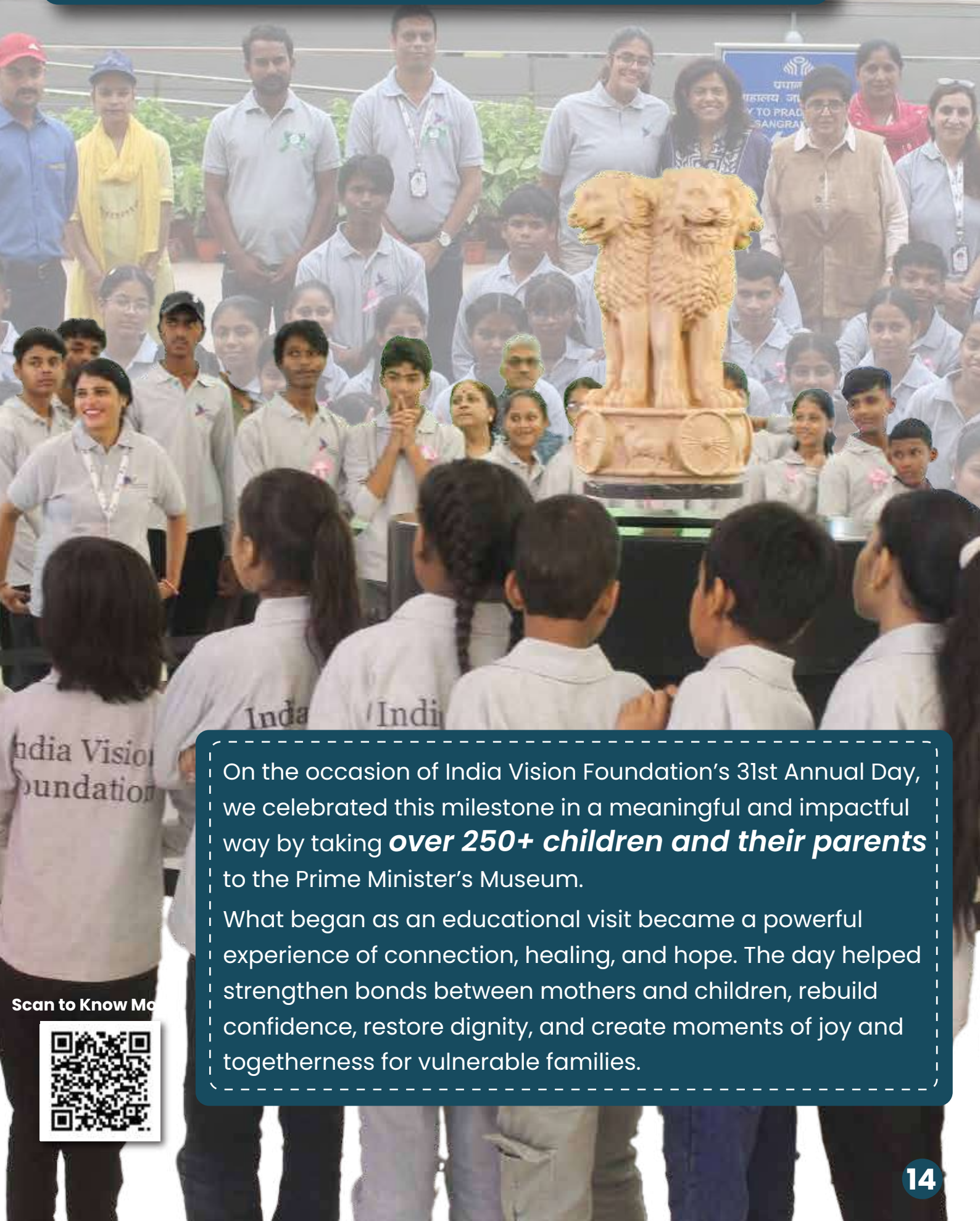

About the Project Atmabal

During 2025-26, Project Atmabal in Yerwada Prison of Maharashtra contributed to the improvement in the health, well-being, and education of the female inmates and the staff and further supported 10 Children of the incarcerated mothers under the Children of Vulnerable families Program.

Project Hope :AMRITSAR PRISON GLIMPSES



In 2025–26, Project Hope at Amritsar Prison trained 20 women inmates in vocational skills and engaged 40 inmates in tie-and-dye workshops, creating 30 dupattas, while 9 inmates earned certificates at the Punjab Prison Olympics 2025.

RADIO PARVAAZ

India Vision Foundation launched Radio Parvaaz, a Prison Community Radio Initiative, to connect inmates facing mental health challenges, especially during COVID-19. The initiative broadcasts engaging content on entertainment, social relevance, and life skills through stories, songs, meditation, and yoga.

IMPACT STORY

01 A Life Interrupted A Spirit Unbroken

After dedicating 32 years to a courier company, Neelkanth Ji's life changed suddenly, leaving him emotionally overwhelmed and uncertain about the future. The transition deeply affected his confidence and mental wellbeing.

02 Finding Hope Through Learning and Reflection

While struggling emotionally inside prison, Neelkanth Ji found comfort through books and spiritual reading in the prison library. This became the first step in rebuilding his emotional strength and inner peace.

03 A Turning Point Through India Vision Foundation

After connecting with India Vision Foundation rehabilitation activities, he participated in theatre and engagement programs that reignited his confidence and gave him a renewed sense of purpose.



04 From Inmate to Radio Jockey & Motivator

Through Radio Parvaaz, Neelkanth Ji was trained as a Radio Jockey and spent nearly 1.5 years motivating fellow inmates through positive conversations, emotional encouragement, and meaningful storytelling.

05 Rebuilding Life with Purpose and Gratitude

After release, Neelkanth Ji restarted his professional journey with renewed confidence and expressed a strong desire to support prison welfare initiatives, using his experiences to inspire and guide others toward positive transformation.

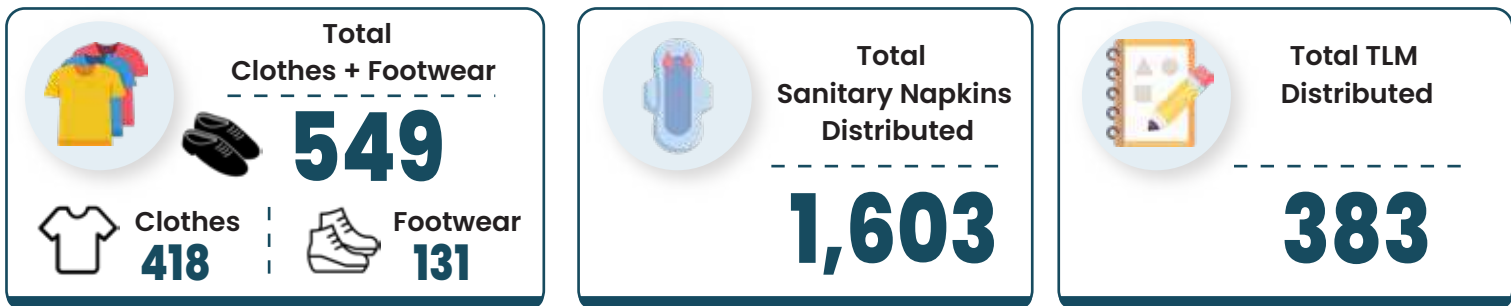

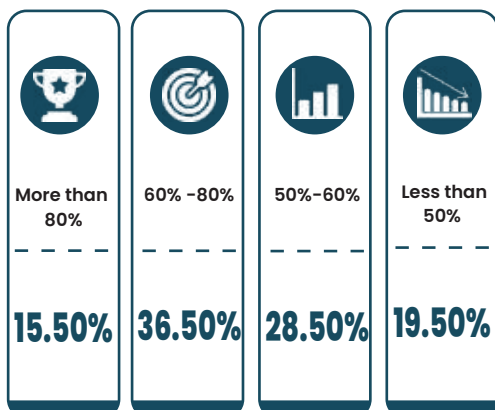

New Year Celebration with Dr. Kiran Bedi's: A Moment of Joy, Confidence, and Belonging



A key highlight of the quarter was **Dr Kiran Bedi's** New Year visit to the community centre, which brought joy, encouragement, and a strong sense of belonging to the children. Beyond the celebration itself, the interaction had important

psychosocial value, positively reinforcing confidence, emotional well-being, and social connectedness.

CVF Orientation Programme for Newly Enrolled Children

India Vision Foundation organized an orientation programme for 40 newly enrolled children and their families under the Children of Vulnerable Families (CVF) programme. The session aimed to create a welcoming and supportive environment while familiarizing children and parents with the programme's educational, psychosocial, and developmental support initiatives.

The day included interactive activities, parent engagement sessions, and group interactions designed to build trust, confidence, and a sense of belonging among the children. The orientation also provided families with an opportunity to understand the support systems available to ensure the holistic growth and well-being of every child.



SDQ Workshop: Strengthening Emotional Wellbeing and Self-Expression



SDQ workshop conducted in collaboration with experts from **JIBS University**, which helped assess and strengthen children's emotional and social wellbeing. Through structured tools and guided activities, the workshop created a safe space for children to reflect on their feelings, while

also helping identify areas where additional **emotional, behavioural, and peer support** may be needed

Exposure Visit: Building Confidence, Social Skills, and Independence

Exposure visit for **13 children**, which offered a valuable learning experience outside the classroom and helped build confidence, social behaviour, and independence. Through guided travel, public interaction, and shared activities, the visit strengthened children's comfort in new environments and supported their overall social development.



118 Hearts Reunited: One day of joy, dignity, and renewed hope



On Children's Day, India Vision Foundation brought **118 beneficiaries—children and parents—together at Dasna Prison** for a Parents–Child Meet filled with warmth and wonder. Tears turned into smiles as families reunited, children danced, and colours came alive through painting and

games. Prizes celebrated participation, while heartfelt words of gratitude reminded everyone: connection heals.

IMPACT STORY

Neha's Journey from care to confidence

1 A Childhood Filled with Care

Neha's journey with India Vision Foundation began in 2006, when her mother was in Tihar Prison. At a young age, she entered the **CVF** support system and lived in the crèche for children.

At a time of uncertainty, IVF became her safety net, offering care, protection, and hope for a secure future.

2 The India Vision Foundation Cradle to Career Model in Action

Early Care → Schooling → Higher Education → Career Pathway

After five years of early support, Neha was admitted to **Assisi Convent School**, where she studied from LKG to Class 12.

CVF's support ensured Neha's education and journey into adulthood stayed on track.



4 Education Became Her Turning Point

After completing Class 12, Neha pursued **BA Honours in Psychology** from IGNOU.

Her academic journey reflects more than educational achievement. It reflects confidence, continuity, and the ability to imagine a future beyond vulnerability.

3 The Change – From Beneficiary to Changemaker

One child supported. Seventy-two youth are now guided. Neha transitioned from an intern to a Project Coordinator, working under the Children of Prisoners Program.

Today, Neha is no longer only a child who received support. She is now part of the system, **mentoring 72 children.**

REHABILITATION AND RE-INTEGRATION PROGRAM

Rehabilitation & Re-integration Program aims to enable the released inmates to put their lives in prison behind them and embark on a journey that recognizes their **talent, skills, and self-respect** to reduce the chances of reoffending and help them reintegrate into society

KEY HIGHLIGHTS

First Ever **ALUMNI MEET** with released beneficiaries and their families

800+ participants, including beneficiaries, families, and school students, came together at the first large-scale Alumni Mela organized with St. Thomas School, Dwarka.

The event aimed to reduce preconceived notions about inmates and celebrate community-led reintegration.



PROJECT NAVAJEEVAN

9 beneficiaries were supported for their livelihood by India Vision Foundation to start **Small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs)** such as tailoring units and food stalls under Project Navajeevan.



Project Navajeevan, a rehabilitation initiative that supports released women inmates by helping them build sustainable livelihoods through entrepreneurship. It uses a structured, assessment-based approach to equip them with skills, tools, and confidence to start their own micro-enterprises, offering a meaningful second chance beyond short-term aid.

CAPACITY BUILDING WORKSHOP

Two structured workshops were conducted under Project Navajeevan in collaboration with New Ventures to strengthen the financial literacy, banking awareness and entrepreneurial readiness of released women inmates. Through interactive sessions, beneficiaries gained practical knowledge on savings, digital payments, government welfare schemes and sustainable livelihood planning, supporting their rehabilitation and economic reintegration.



IMPACT STORY

Farhana's Story: Strength Forged Through Struggle

(Farhana's name changed)

Farhana, a 32-year-old woman, is a living example of how resilience, determination, and hope can transform difficult circumstances into a story of strength and success.

01 Against All Odds, A Desire to Learn

Coming from a community where girls' education was never a priority, Farhana carried a quiet but powerful desire to learn.

During her time in prison, she chose not to surrender to despair. Instead, when India Vision Foundation counselled her, she **enrolled in a computer course** through the inside prison program, believing that education could become her pathway forward.

03 Overcoming Challenges, Achieving Dreams

The journey wasn't easy. Farhana faced financial struggles, self-doubt, and emotional challenges, but with the constant support and guidance of India Vision Foundation, she kept moving forward.

She successfully completed her nursing training and became a **GNM worker, earning ₹30,000 per month**, achieving both financial independence and personal growth.



02 From Release to a New Beginning

When Farhana was released in June 2023, the challenges multiplied, social stigma, responsibility of three children, and the uncertainty of starting life again.

She reached out to India Vision Foundation under **Rehabilitation and Reintegration Program**. With consistent mentoring, the Foundation supported her journey by enrolling in a **GNM (General Nursing and Midwifery)**.

Today, Farhana is **confident and independent**. Her husband, once unsure, now supports her fully.

Still connected with India Vision Foundation, she shares her journey to inspire others. Despite social barriers, motherhood, and past struggles, Farhana never gave up, emerging as a skilled nurse and a **role model for her community**.

Impact Assessment Report of Project SAAKAAR by Madhurima Dhanuka

This impact study provides a comprehensive review of the effectiveness of Project SAAKAAR: A project initiated by the India Vision Foundation in 2023 that aimed at supporting released prisoners in rebuilding their lives by starting small businesses.



Impact of Hand textile craft practices on the well-being of women creators by Sakshi Babbar Paul, PhD Scholar from NIFT, Delhi.

This study aimed to identify, select, and train female inmates of Gurugram Prison for training in craft work and then study the impact of the Hand textile craft practices on the well-being of these creators by using a prescribed testing method and comparing with non-participating inmates to augment the hypothesis and past research in the field.



Impact of Prison Library

The study aimed to evaluate how prison libraries and reading impact prisoners' well-being, perceived stress, and sense of hope. Also, it aims to assess the impact of the library program on improving the prisoners' overall psychological well-being, in reducing stress felt by prisoners, in increasing prisoners' hope for the future, and to evaluate any other qualitative improvements after the introduction of the prison library program.



Impact of the Prison STD Calling

The study aimed to gather data from prison inmates of the Gurugram district prison who are using the STD calling facility available in the prison to evaluate how constant contact with family members affects inmates' well-being, perceived stress, and resilience. A questionnaire including demographic details, general questions regarding STD calling, and three psychological scales were administered, including:

Psychological well-being scale: WHO-5 Well-Being Index

Stress Scale: Perceived Stress Scale (PSS)

Resilience Scale: Brief Resilience Scale (BRS)

Cells to self-reliance: How former inmates are rebuilding their lives, one skill at a time

Noida: For years, the world for these women was reduced to high walls, iron gates and a daily fight to stay hopeful. Now, they are piecing life back together — using vocational skills learnt in Dasma and Luksar jails to earn, raise children and reclaim dignity after release. Reema (name changed on request) knows that journey intimately. Arrested in 2022 after being accused of her husband's murder, she ended up in Dasma jail at 22 with a criminal case hanging over her and a five-year-old daughter waiting outside. Last year, she secured bail and returned to Noida, determined to stand on her own feet. Today, she earns a modest income as a freelance beautician in her neighbourhood — work she learnt inside prison. "Before jail, I was a housewife. My husband abused and threatened me. I lost my

financial independence. In jail, I enrolled in a beautician course. I decided that when I stepped out, I would earn on my own and not depend on anyone for household expenses," she said. On Saturday, Reema joined other former inmates from the two jails at Delhi's Lodhi Garden for a Women's Day gathering organised by India Vision Foundation, a non-profit organisation founded by former IPS officer Kiran Bedi that works with women rebuilding their lives after prison. For several of them, it was their first public event since release. "Many didn't even know such a day existed until we told them," a coordinator said. Inside Dasma and Luksar, prison barracks often double as classrooms. Inmates spend hours each week learning trades such as beauty services, tailoring and sewing, embroidery, work, basic

computer skills, and adult literacy for those who never had the chance to attend school. For many, it is the first time they acquire a professional skill that can translate into income outside. "Many women come to jail with almost no financial independence or work experience. When they start learning these skills, it gives them confidence and the possibility of earning a livelihood once they are released," said Hussain Zaidi, who runs the foundation's rehabilitation programme in the two jails. One former inmate from Luksar jail, arrested with her husband in a drugs case, spent nearly five years in custody before court acquitted her. While in jail, she completed a basic computer course under the programme. After release, the certificate helped her get a data entry job at a private company in Sector 4 of Noida. Her salary now pays for household needs and her son's schooling.
